The Murfreesboro Community Concert Band was organized in 1984 for area musicians who had played in high school and college bands but were without a performance outlet for their years of instrumental experience. Joseph T. Smith was the founding director and conductor from 1984 to 2000. The band, now known as the Tennessee Valley Winds, comprises area band directors and local professionals such as doctors, salespersons, accountants, university students, and teachers. Meeting weekly, these men and women continue their enjoyment of band music with a degree of proficiency which will astound the listener.

The band enjoys a most enviable reputation from musicians as well as from "the person on the street." While the men and women in the band are serious about their music, the group's concerts are designed for a variety of tastes and the enjoyment of all. A typical concert program elicits a variety of responses: toe tapping to a hoedown, melancholia to a Stephen Foster folk song, sultry sensuousness to a Wagnerian love song, or rousing excitement to the William Tell Overture.

David R. Holsinger



Having served 15 years as composer in residence to Shady Grove Church, Grand Prairie, Texas, award-winning composer/conductor David R. Holsinger now resides in Cleveland, Tennessee, where he directs the Wind Ensemble at Lee University.


Holsinger's compositions have won four national competitions including two ABA Ostwald Awards. His works have also been finalists in the NBA and Sudler competitions. Educated at Central Methodist College, Fayette, Missouri; Central Missouri State University, Warrensburg; and the University of Kansas, Lawrence; Holsinger was recently presented with an honorary doctorate and the Gustavus Fine Arts Medallion from Gustavus Adolphus College in Minnesota He was also named a national patron of Delta Omicron Music Fraternity. In the summer of 1998, the United States Air Force Band of the West featured Holsinger as the Heritage VI composer during the Texas Bandmasters Association convention in San Antonio. This prestigious series celebrating American wind composers was founded in 1992 and has previously honored Morton Gould, Ron Nelson, Robert Jager, W. Francis McBeth, and Roger Nixon. An elected member of the American Bandmasters Association, Holsinger's recent honors include the Distinguished Music Alumni Award from Central Missouri State, Coda's 1999 Director of the Year Citation, and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia's Orpheus Award. This past year Holsinger served as distinguished composer in residence at Georgia Southern University, Statesboro, and held the Acuff Chair of Excellence in the Creative Arts at Austin Peay State University, Clarksville, Tennessee.

In addition to his university duties, Holsinger spends much of his energies as a guest composer and conductor with allstate organizations, professional bands, and university ensembles throughout the United States. When not composing or conducting he plays with his HO train layout.

Deanna Rae Hahn



Deanna Hahn is in her second year as assistant professor of music in flute at Middle Tennessee State University, She holds degrees from Indiana University and the University of Northern Iowa and is currently a candidate for the doctor of music degree from Indiana University. Ms. Hahn performs as a regular member of the Stones River Chamber Players and the Tennessee Philharmonic and has been heard on Nashville's WPLN "Live from Studio C" radio broadcasts. She was a winner in the 1998 and 1996 National Flute Association's Young Artist competition as well as the recipient of an award for best performance of a newly commissioned work at the 1996 convention. Ms. Hahn's primary instructors include James Scott, Kate Lukas, Peter Lloyd, Trevor Wye, and Angeleita Floyd.





Richard Anthony Murphy

Richard Murphy is director of bands at Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro, where he guides all facets of the University Band, including conducting the University Wind Ensemble, the University's premier wind and percussion ensemble, teaching conducting and wind band literature, and supervising instrumental student teaching. Prior to his appointment at MTSU, he has been band director at three Nashville high schools—Hillwood, McGavock, and Antioch. The Nashville bands under his direction consistently distinguished themselves by receiving superior ratings in both concert and marching events, performing at state music conventions, and receiving many first-place trophies.

Murphy is an active drill writer and consultant for numerous bands throughout the nation and is a staff drill writer for Arrangers' Publishing Company, where he publishes approximately twenty charts a year. He has been on the faculty at Vanderbilt University's Blair School of Music, was conductor of the Nashville Youth Repertory Orchestra, has been awarded two Citations of Excellence for his contributions to the profession by the National Band Association, and has been inducted into the Middle Tennessee State University Band of Blue Hall of Fame. He holds membership in many professional organizations, is an elected member of Phi Beta Mu, and serves as conductor, clinician, and adjudicator throughout the United States.



Terry Jolley

Terry Jolley is a native of Decherd, Tenn., and a graduate of Middle Tennessee State University where he received a B.M. in Instrumental Music Education and a M.A. in Music. Prior to assuming his current position as associate director of bands at MTSU, he served as co-director of Bands at John Overton High School in Nashville, Tenn., and as director of bands at Warren County Senior High School in McMinnville, Tenn. He was previously a graduate teaching assistant as well as pep band director at MTSU. His bands have been recognized on the national level with awards such as the Sudler Shield presented by the John Philip Sousa Foundation. While at Overton, his bands participated in many events, including the Fiesta Bowl Parade and Pageant in Phoenix, Ariz., and the Magic Music Days Parade in Orlando, Fla. His band in Warren County was selected as the lead band in the 1991 Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City.

Jolley has served as chair of the Tennessee All-State Band. He was selected to Who's Who Among American Teachers in 1994 and 1996. He currently holds the position of principle horn with the Tennessee Valley Winds and has performed at the Mid-West International Band and Orchestra Clinic held in Chicago. He held the position of assistant music production coordinator of the Tennessee Governor's School for the Arts for three years and was the recipient of the National Collegiate Music Award.

Jolly holds membership in the National Band Association, Tennessee Music Educators Association, International Association of Jazz Educators, Middle Tennessee School Band and Orchestra Association, Music Educators National Conference, Tennessee Education Association, National Education Association, Percussive Arts Society, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, a professional music fraternity, and Phi Beta Mu National School Bandmasters Fraternity.



Joseph Smith

Joseph Smith, director emeritus of Middle Tennessee State University Bands, served 36 years as director of marching band, symphonic band, and wind ensemble. During his tenure at MTSU, he was instrumental in establishing the nationally televised "Contest of Champions," the Southeastern Instrumental Clinics, the Tennessee Bandmasters State Concert Festival, the All-State Wind Ensemble Conference, and the highly respected Tennessee Valley Winds.

He has been awarded six Citations of Excellence for his contributions to the profession by the National Band Association, both in marching and concert band. The Mid-West International Band and Orchestra Board bestowed on him the Medal of Honor for the performance by the Tennessee Valley Winds in Chicago, III. Mr. Smith was featured in the School Musician for his contributions to bands in America, and was selected as a national patron of Delta Omicron. In 1985 he was recognized as a Distinguished Alumnus of MTSU. He holds membership in various honorary fraternities and professional organizations and is an elected member of Phi Beta Mu and the prestigious American Bandmasters Association.



Virginia Allen




Virginia Allen is an independent artist residing in New York City, where she is a member of the conducting faculty at The Juilliard School. She studied French horn and conducting and earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree and a Master of Music degree in Performance from the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., and a Diploma in Wind Conducting from the University of Calgary. She also completed an internship in Performance Activities at Juilliard.

A former conductor in the U.S. Army Bands Program, Allen was a pioneer for women in military bands. She was the first woman to command and conduct an active duty military band that included women when she was appointed principal conductor of the Army's band in Atlanta. As the associate conductor of the United States Military Academy Band at West Point, she was the first woman conductor of that historic organization as well as the Cadet Glee Club and Cadet Band. She also performed on stages from the Hollywood Bowl to Europe as the first women conductor of the Army's premier touring ensembles from Washington, D.C. — The U.S. Army Field Band and The Soldiers' Chorus. Her military career included an assignment as the Department of the Army Staff Bands Officer in Washington, D.C., where she managed over 100 Army bands and band activities worldwide.

Allen frequently guest conducts, adjudicates, and teaches master classes in the U.S. and internationally. She conducted Joseph Alessi, principal trombonist of the New York Philharmonic, and The Juilliard Trombone Choir on a compact disc recording titled *At the End of the Century*, which was released by the International Trombone Association in 1999. Allen is also a composer and arranger, and her transcription of Eric Ewazen's *Concerto for Tuba or Bass Trombone* was premiered by Blair Bollinger, bass trombonist of the Philadelphia Orchestra, and the Temple University Wind Ensemble in February 2000. She has other compositions published by Ludwig Music and TRN Music.

Andrew Boysen, Jr.



Andrew Boysen, Jr., is an assistant professor of music at the University of New Hampshire where he teaches conducting and orchestration and conducts the wind symphony. Previously, Boysen served as an assistant professor and acting associate director of bands at Indiana State University where he directed the Marching Sycamores, conducted the Symphonic band, and taught in the music education program. Prior to that appointment, he was the director of bands at Cary-Grove (Ill.) High School and music director/conductor of the Deerfield Community Concert Band. He is active as a guest conductor and clinician appearing with high school, university, and festival ensembles across the United States and in the U.K.

Boysen earned his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in wind conducting at the Eastman School of Music where he served as conductor of the Eastman Wind Orchestra and assistant conductor of the Eastman Wind Ensemble. He received his Master of Music degree in wind conducting from Northwestern University in 1993 and his Bachelor of Music degree in music education and music composition from the University of Iowa in 1991.

He maintains an active schedule as a composer and has received commissions from the Herbert Hoover Presidential Library, the Cedar Rapids Metropolitan Orchestra Festival, the Iowa All-State Band, the Rhode Island All-State Band, the Nebraska State Bandmasters Association, and university and high school concert bands across the country. Boysen won the University of Iowa Honors Composition Prize in 1991 and has twice won the Claude T. Smith Memorial Band Composition Contest, in 1991 for *I Am* and in 1994 for *Ovations*. His published works with the Neil A. Kjos Music Company include pieces for band, orchestra, clarinet and piano, and brass choir. Recordings of his music appear on the Sony, R-Kal, Mark, St. Olaf, and Elf labels.
