Robert J. Bradshaw, Guest Composer

Award-winning composer Robert J. Bradshaw strives to forge a unique connection between composer, musicians and audiences. His compositions have been heard throughout the Americas, Europe, Asia and Middle East. Mr. Bradshaw's numerous commissions include works for the American String Teachers Association with NSOA, New England Musical Heritage Initiative / New England String Ensemble and the Pappoutsakis Flute Competition. His music has been honored with first place awards by the Alabama Orchestra Association Composition Competition and the Manchester Music Festival Composition Competition which included a performance of "Articles Nor-east" at Lincoln Center, New York. Many of Mr. Bradshaw's compositions, commissions and residencies have been made possible through generous support provided by arts organizations. These organizations include Meet the Composer, American Music Center, National Endowment for the Arts, American Composers Forum, Harvard Musical Association, Harpley Foundation, Argosy Foundation, and the Massachusetts Cultural Council.

Passionate about expressing himself through the abstract art of music, Robert has always loved composing. Winner of many commissions and awards, he is convinced that classical music is alive and well in America.

Cibele Sabioni, mezzo-soprano

Cibele Sabioni graduated with a degree in instrumental conducting from the Conservatory of Tatuí, where she also teaches Vocal Brazilian Genres. She has a Bachelors degree in classical piano from the University of Bauru in Sãu Paulo specializing in Havana-Cuba. As a choir director, she has established five groups, working very intensively on Brazilian repertoire. She has worked as a voice guest clinician at the National Theatre Festival of Curitiba, National Conservatoire of Assuncion, Paraguay and at the National University of Villa Maria, Argentina in "Vocal Brazilian Genres." In 2005, Cibele was a guest artist of the Brazilian Wind Orchestra, with the Brazilian Talk Quartet, and a tour of five concerts in the city of Sãu Paulo with repertoire of sambas especially arranged for those concerts. Also, she was the guest singer of the Orquestra de Vientos of Santa Rosa, Argentina with the Municipal Wind Orchestra of Bilbao, Spain, singing Brazilian repertoire. Cibele is a singer in the Brazilian Talk Quartet, a group invited to represent Brazil in the Latin Culture Festival at the Berklee College of Music in Boston, focusing on developing wide research on the technique and interpretation of Brazilian song through the history of Brazil.

Cibele participated on the first and second South American Conference of Composers and Conductors of Symphonic Band in Tatuí, and the third Ibero-American Conference in Cordoba, Argentina. In 2006 in Minneapolis, MN, she participated in the State Conference of Music Education. In 2007 she was one of the band directors invited to perform at the first Latin America Meeting of Composers, Arrangers and Band Directors and conducted the Just Women Symphonic Band at the Memorial of Latin American in Sãu Paulo.

She is currently a conductor at the Conservatory of Tatuí, and founding member of the Latin American Foro of Women Conductors of Symphonic Bands, Ensembles and Orchestras.

Dario Sotelo, Guest Conductor

Dario Sotelo graduated with degrees in Piano, Violin, Viola and Fine Arts, and in 1983 joined the Conservatory of Tatui. In 1984 he formed his first children's orchestra, and from 1986 to 1991 he was in charge of the String Department. In 1991, he received a scholarship from the British Council to complete a masters degree in conducting at City University of London, where he studied with Ezra Rachlin, disciple of the great conductor Fritz Reiner. As part of this course, he conducted four concertos, appearing as a special guest for one performance.

Returning to Brazil in 1993, Sotelo was invited to be the Artistic Director and Conductor of the Brazilian Wind Orchestra and since 1998 he has been the Principal Conductor of the Paulista Symphonic Orchestra. In 2002 and 2004 he became the General Coordinator of the first and second South-America Regional Conference of Wind Band Composers, Arrangers and Conductors. In 2006 he established the first National Composers Meeting in Tatuí and in 2007 the first Latin American Meeting of Composers, Arrangers and Band Directors.

He established very close collaborations with Brazilian composers and arrangers through commissioning, revising, editing and premiering new works with the symphonic and string orchestra and symphonic band. His repertoire includes more than 70 premieres of Brazilian compositions. Sotelo has been invited to conduct in numerous countries around the world including: Hungary, Spain, England, USA, South Africa, Paraguay, Argentina and within his native Brazil.

Dr. Rodney Dorsey

Rodney Dorsey is the Associate Director of Bands at the University of Michigan where he conducts the concert band, teaches undergraduate conducting, and conducts the *Michigan Youth Band*. He has also served on the faculties of DePaul and Northwestern Universities.

Ensembles under Dr. Dorsey's direction have performed at several state and national events including the Bands of America National Concert Band Festival. He is active

as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator in the United States and Hungary.

Mr. John Easley

John Easley is in his 26th year of teaching and his 23rd year as the Director of Bands at Union City High School in Tennessee. During his tenure, the band has received numerous honors including five-time finalist at the MTSU Contest of Champions, five-time Tennessee Class AA State Champions, and Bands of America Class A Champions.

Mr. Easley is active professionally in a number of organizations and currently serves as the Director of Music at the First United Methodist Church of Union City. He is also ac-

tive as a guest clinician and adjudicator throughout the Southeastern United States.

Mr. Tom Caneva

Thomas Caneva is the Director of Bands and an Associate Professor of Music at Ball State University. Dr. Caneva has also served on the faculties of the University of Illinois,

University of Colorado, Auburn University, and the University of Texas.

Active as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator throughout the United States and Canada, Caneva has presented lectures/clinics at College Band Director's National Association Regional and National Conventions, Music Educator's National Association State Conventions, and at the CBDNA Conducting Symposium.

Mr. Dario Sotelo

Dario Sotelo is the Artistic Director and Conductor of the *Brazilian Wind Orchestra*, and the Principal Conductor of the *Paulista Symphonic Orchestra*. He is also the General Coordinator of the *I and II South-American Regional Conference of Wind Band Com-*

posers, Arrangers, and Conductors.

Mr. Sotelo has established close collaborations with Brazilian composers and arrangers through commissioning, revising, editing, and premiering new works with the symphonic and string orchestra and symphonic band. His repertoire includes more than 70 premiers of Brazilian compositions. Sotelo has been invited to conduct in Hungary, Spain, England, South Africa, Paraguay, Argentina, and the United States.
